Climate action plan

As a Trust, we recognise our responsibility to ensure that our children and staff understand the current climate crisis and how our actions leave environmental footprints. With this knowledge, we continually seek to reduce our environmental impact by developing sustainable approaches to our daily operations and enabling our children and staff to see themselves as agents of change.

Through our Trust Eco Council and Crofty Coastal Crew, alongside the integrated work of the Trust Operations team, we work together towards our sustainability goals. Our climate action plan is one that we discuss, devise and work on together. Our five agreed strategic drivers (Use less, Buy Smart, Build Knowledge, Be agents of change and Recognise Success) enable us to deliver our stated actions. Inspired by the United Nations approach to climate action for children, we use the eight superheroes to provide a framework to guide our objectives. Each hero has a defined pledge; all Trust Eco-councillors sign to agree that they will work to deliver the pledge within their schools. These pledges are supplemented by key focus objectives throughout each year both at Trust and individual school level.

Reducing energy consumption	Energy Expert We pledge to reduce our energy consumption for the school using our smart technology to monitor	ClearVue (zoned smart metering) is now in place in 16 of the school sites. Regular review meetings are undertaken by the Estates team and monthly reports have been provided. Unexplained or unusual peaks have been investigated and actions taken to address as relevant The 'Big Switch Off' has been introduced across the Trust (with particular focus on holiday time). Smart technology enables tracking of the impact of this. Kitchen facilities have been shared across two additional schools with food being transported between the two by electric vehicle. This has significantly reduced energy consumption 7 out of 18 Crofty schools now have meals produced on other sites reducing the energy required to run multiple kitchens. Large procurement projects have taken into consideration the environmental impact of operations during scoring. Where suppliers are used, we have actively engaged with them and utilised the links to upskill our children and staff	children to consider energy use and create their own actions / next steps for reducing environmental impact. 		 eg wonky veg workshops with Chartwells and beekeeper talks with our beekeepers. Solar panels on our schools showed savings of £42,585 and 23,583kg of CO₂ from Nov 2024 to Oct 2025. It would take 390 tree seedlings to grow for 10 years to absorb this amount of CO₂. 		
Biodiversity	Green Guide "We pledge to work with our school cooking team to raise awareness of wonky fruit and vegetables"	Re-wilding awareness has been raised through work undertaken with the Trust Eco council. A number of schools have developed wildflower areas and have considered the wealth of biodiversity currently on their school sites that needs protection. Two of our schools (Roskear and Rosemellin) were successful in receiving £10K of funding each to deliver projects to develop biodiversity on their sites. Our Eco-council visited Paradise Park to learn more about indigenous and non-indigenous animals and consider the habitats they need to survive. Focus was given to endangered animals and how human actions can be destructive to environments. A focus on foraging safely and the work of bees formed the focus of the Trust Eco-Council summit this year. All of our schools gained their Eco School award making up 41% of all Cornwall Schools with the award in the 24/25 academic year	Natural Beauty: Landscape Connections project	Dec 25 onwards

The Trust's co-constructed Climate Change / Sustainability curriculum has run in all Trust schools through a sustainability focus week during the summer term. Work completed has been shared amongst schools to stimulate creative thinking and share good practice. All schools have included information about climate related work within their newsletters (through the work of the Eco council or through individually shaped school-based work) Procurement has incorporated consideration of more sustainable contacts, suppliers and purchases wherever practicable including cleaning products. Waste, consumption and recycling	Recycle Ranger "We pledge to make sure that the school has recycling bins and that we are reducing our general waste to refill."	Continued focus on recycling within all our schools and shared services team office. Working alongside Biffa, we have identified that we recycled 41% of our waste over the last year. With the help of a successful funding bid, completed the 'ultimate recycling project' – moving unused Elliot huts from Treloweth School to replace two failing Elliot huts at Godolphin School - creating classrooms for a school without the footprint of creating new buildings!
